There is a lot of vocabulary ("church terms") that comes with participating in a fairly traditional church setting. At the top of my head as I write this is "the chancel" and its frequent misnomer, the stage. As people sit in the pews during worship, it's easy to see the front of the worship space as a stage. It's a raised platform. People sit and look at where nearly all of the visual action of the service happens. But if the front of the church is the stage, would that make the congregation the audience? Audiences watch and observe. TV shows with a live studio audience may ask the audience to participate with scripted laughs or claps or "awws," but even then, the audience is a passive part of the show. Their role can just as easily be filled by laugh tracks and recorded sound effects.

But the chancel is not a stage, and the congregation is not an audience. Though much of the service is scripted, the congregation cannot be replaced by recorded responses or sound effects. The worship service relies on the full participation of everyone present. We join our voices in song. We lift our hearts in prayer and thanksgiving. We extend the peace of Christ to one another. The list goes on. In fact, "liturgy," the church word used to describe everything that happens in a worship service (i.e. the words, the songs, the motions), means "work of the people." Whether someone is in the chancel or in the pews, everyone is a full participant in the liturgy.

As an extension of this congregational responsibility to participate for the entirety of the liturgy, we have several roles in any given worship service for which individuals take particular care and responsibility. The ordained clergy are responsible for word and sacrament, but much of the rest of the service is led by representatives of the congregation. We have people preparing the space for worship, unlocking doors, turning lights on, putting paraments on the pulpit and altar, setting up the elements for communion, lighting the candles, etc. We have people who greet people as they walk in the door, inviting each person to be seen and welcomed to fully participate in the liturgy. We have people who read scripture and prayers. We have people collecting the offering and distributing communion. We have people tending to our virtual attendees. And there are certainly more ways that people can take particular responsibility and lead or assist in a part of the service as a representative of the congregation.

On November 9 and 16, as we prepare our spaces and our hearts for Christmas celebrations, we will turn our attention to the ways that we all participate in the work of the people, inviting people to take leadership roles not as a part of a Sunday morning performance, but as a representative of the congregation. You are not being pressured to take any specific role, but you are invited to take these weeks for the opportunity that they are, an opportunity to see with fresh eyes how every person in the sanctuary is a full participant in the liturgy, and how you might be able to fulfill a needed role in this group work.

October 26 is a celebration of the legendary night when Martin Luther nailed the 95 Theses to the Wittenberg Church door to inspire debate in protest of the selling of indulgences in 1517. Because this is remembered as the tipping point for the beginning of the Protestant Reformations, we celebrate in church on the last Sunday of October by remembering reformations of the past and all the ways the church is continuing to reform. To add to the fun, we invite you to wear red to worship!

All Saints Worship - November 2

Commemorating the saints of the church has been a practice since the 4th century. In the 8th century, the festival commemorating all saints was set on November 1st. Protestant churches (including Lutherans) believe that all Christian dead are saints, and there is no need for release from purgatory. In our bulletin on November 2, we will remember our loved ones who have died. As we remember them, we recall the witness they gave through their lives, what they meant to us as fellow Christians, where they have led the way, and what they have left for us yet to accomplish.

Sung Evening Prayer

Following the Wednesday evening dinner and discussion on the titles of Jesus, we will have sung evening prayer in the sanctuary using the Holden Evening Prayer service. The service will begin at approximately 7:15pm and will conclude around 8:00pm. This quiet, contemplative service offers space to reflect on the themes of Advent as we meditate on the titles of Jesus and how they each help us connect with God as we prepare for Christmas celebrations.

Joint Youth-Led Worship - November 23

Our Joint Kids Club and Youth Group with Mars United Presbyterian Church will help curate and lead worship on November 17 at 9:00am. To celebrate this joint ministry, the members of Mars United Presbyterian Church will come to St. John and Pastor Brian will preach. Youth participants are asked to arrive at the church at 8:00 am to get ready for the service.



<u>Advent Begins – November 30</u> Advent is the **season of preparation** as we get ready for Christmas. Regardless of what day of the week Christmas is, Advent is always the four Sundays leading up to Christmas. Join us in worship as we wait for the coming Christ child and get ready for the gift of Christmas. Make sure your child gets their own Advent calendar to count down to Christmas during worship on November 24, the last Sunday of the church year. If you and/or your family

"One of my favorite things about the Reformation is the opportunity it creates to wonder about how the Spirit might be moving, forming, and reforming God's people. Martin Luther is said to have nailed his 95 Theses to the Wittenberg church doors and really started the debate which opened the doors for a reformation of the church. In our time, might the Spirit be inviting us to take stock, ponder, and imagine. What are the central claims as God's people that we need to be clear about today? What are the ways that we see and sense God at work? What are the ways we feel God is inviting us now to serve and respond as stewards of God's love? These questions might not lead to our own 95 theses, but they might make for fun and deep discernment for disciples and stewards in the faith community."

Reformation is celebrated in the congregation on the last Sunday in October in remembrance of the traditional date of Luther's posting of the 95 Theses on October 31, 1517.

4th Quarter Mission Emphasis: Butler Hospital The Food Institute

Food insecurity impacts people throughout the community, and food insecurity often leads to a higher prevalence for diseases, obesity, and other measures that are tied to poor health. Food insecurity can happen due to a disruption of food intake because of lack of money or other resources. Neighborhood conditions may affect food insecurity, but food insecurity can happen anywhere. Some people experience food insecurity for just a short time; others are in a chronic state of insecurity. To support this community need, The Food Institute was created to make nutritious meals a reality for more families in the region.

How it works:

- Your doctor provides a referral for the Food Institute.
- Referral includes one monthly visit for four months.
- Each monthly visit lasts about 45 minutes where you will:
 - Receive a nutrition lesson
 - Learn healthy eating on a budget
 - Leave with nutritious food and recipes for up to 10 meals

How you can help:

St. John Food Pantry

We have had several new individuals and families stopping by the food pantry. Though they frequently come outside of office hours, we are able to stop and talk with them occasionally. Each time we talk to someone who is utilizing the gift of the little food pantry, they are simply grateful for whatever it is we are able to offer. When we have a variety of food and essentials, we are able to help people find something that particularly brings a smile to their face – their favorite cereal brand or soap fragrance or a snack that they would not have the luxury of purchasing for themselves. We would not be able to have such an offering if it were not for the generosity and care of members of this community. As Christians, we are called to love our



neighbors as ourselves, and we do this by keeping the food pantry in good supply, even of thinking of items that might in some circles be considered "treats." On behalf of everyone who visits the pantry, thank you. Please continue inviting people to make use of the pantry as needed!

Serving on the Boards

St. John is run by three boards consisting of seven people each, the Deacons, the Elders, and the Trustees. We also have a Mission Endowment Fund Committee, an Audit Committee, a Nominating Committee, and a Mutual Ministry Committee. Each December we elect individuals to serve on each of the boards and committees (the Mutual Ministry Committee is filled by appointment). We are always in need of new people willing to serve. Each term is 2 years long and individuals are welcome to serve for 1 or 2 terms. Though there is often some overlap, each board has its primary areas of responsibility. The Deacons are responsible for visiting the homebound, overseeing stewardship practices and events, and planning fellowship opportunities. The Elders are responsible for Christian education and faith formation, evangelism, and worship life within the congregation. The Trustees are responsible for taking care of the physical property of the church and overseeing the finances and budget. The Mission Endowment Committee listens to the community and disburses funds collected as interest on an account set aside for mission support. If you have interest in serving or know someone you think has gifts for serving in one of these areas, contact the office to be put in contact with a member of the nominating committee (the committee in charge of preparing the ballot for election to the boards/committee).

Faith Formation Confirmation Class

What does it mean to be a member of a church? Confirmation class is a time for our students in 6th-8th grade to develop deeper scriptural understanding and more robust connection to their faith and identity as a member of the church. **In September and October, the students explored the creed and what we are saying when we recite these ancient words in each worship service.** Class meets on the fourth Saturday of each month, 9:30-11:30am.

Faith Formation (continued)

Adult Bible Study - Titles of Jesus

Come and explore the varied ways in which Christ comes to us and how traditional titles and imagery from scripture helps us to connect with Jesus in our Christmas preparations.

Throughout the series we will explore titles for Christ that are drawn from the Hebrew Bible, hearing them as an opportunity to enrich our own understanding and connection with Christ and hearing them in the Jewish context in which they originated and in which they are still treasured. The same readings will be used on Wednesday and the following Sunday.

On Wednesdays (11/5 – 12/17, excluding 11/26), we will gather at 6:30pm for a light supper while we openly discuss scripture readings related to the topic of the evening. At approximately 7:15pm, we will move to the sanctuary for sung evening prayer with the readings of the evening read in worship. Worship will conclude at approximately 8:00pm.

On Sundays (11/9 – 12/21, excluding 11/30), we will have our traditional Bible Study format beginning at 6:30pm. We will study the texts that support the various titles of Jesus used in the Advent season with our typical outline of notes.

Because of the different formats of Wednesdays and Sundays, you are welcome to come to one or the other or both as you like! Due to the nature of Wednesday evenings in this series, **only Sundays will be offered via zoom** in addition to in person.

Kids Club/Youth Group - November 2, 16

The Mars Area Youth Group (grades 6-12) and Kids' Club (grades 2-5) are joint ministries supported by Mars United Presbyterian and St. John Lutheran Church. Each group meets approximately twice per month, sometimes meeting in the church buildings (Youth Group at Mars United Presbyterian, Kids Club at St John), sometimes meeting together for joint social and service events.

In November, the two groups will be preparing to lead the worship service on November 23rd during their meetings. Meetings are 4:00 – 5:30 pm at the respective churches. After each meeting, families are invited to gather for dinner. On November 2nd, dinner will be at St. John. On November 16th, dinner will be at Mars United Presbyterian. Messy Church -November 21

"At the heart of every Messy Church gathering are values that shape who we are and how we live our faith together. These values remind us that Messy Church is more than crafts, songs, and meals. **It's**

a way of being church that welcomes all ages, celebrates God's creativity and joy, and centers us in Christ's transforming love.

Rooted in hospitality and shared life, these values guide every Messy Church community around the world." (messychurchusa.org)

Messy Church at St. John is no different. We begin by eating dinner together at 6:00pm. Then after a brief, interactive story-telling, activities are opened for families to explore together at their own pace in a flexible

environment. At the end of the evening, we bring our whole selves - our hearts, voices, and bodies to celebration of God's creative goodness in praise songs and prayer, **ending at 8:00pm.**

When you see an apple on a tree, you know it's an apple tree. How do you know when the Spirit is working in and through someone? When you see the fruit of the Spirit growing in them! In November we will learn about the fruits of the Spirit, how the Holy Spirit helps us to live as Christians and just what that looks like.

Faith Formation (continued)

Sunday Faith Formation Hour

Each Sunday, we gather in the lower level of the building for Faith Formation for all ages. Hospitality is offered in the form of goodies and drinks. You are welcome to go downstairs immediately following worship and begin enjoying these goodies. At approximately 10:15am, we begin an all-ages together Bible game to help all of us develop greater familiarity with the Bible. At approximately 10:30am, people are invited to move into age-based groups to explore different topics as outlined below.

Pre-K through 5th Grade

The Pre-K through elementary classes will explore stories of God's people in the Hebrew Bible through interactive storytelling and crafts. Students are asked to bring their Bibles to each class as they will be encouraged to find stories in their Bible, learning to mark their Bibles as they engage with the story. Students will be given a take-home sheet each week to help families continue the conversations at home. See below for a schedule of lessons to be covered each week this month:

Middle and High School

A note from the teacher, Ruth Ann: "A discussion sheet with Bible references will be provided each class session. We try to bring these discussions to a purposeful conclusion, always remembering the participants are kids! We use Bibles each session, and I am hoping students will bring their own personal Bibles. They will be encouraged to mark, highlight, and put notes in their Bibles for future assistance. Thank you for sending me these inquisitive young people. I will do my best to broaden their Biblical knowledge, connecting their faith to daily life."
