The other day I got snared into a nasty bit of traffic. And it just so happened that the traffic stopped me right in front of a Unitarian Universalist church with a big LED sign out front. As I was waiting for traffic to move, I was casually watching the slides come and go on the sign. But one slide caught my eye. It was formatted like above, calling people to not only believe that there is good in the world... but to *be* the good. Traffic was rough that day, so I watched that slide come across the sign several times. Other than keeping an eye on the traffic to see when it would move, watching the sign became meditative. I'd see the phrase and contemplate what it meant to not only believe there is good in the world, but also to *be* the good that is in the world. My mind would wander into thinking of things to do and people to call when I got out of traffic, but then the phrase would come back on, bringing my thoughts back to being the good in the world.

In Luther's explanation of the Eighth Commandment ("Thou shall not bear false witness against your neighbor."), Luther expands it to be more than just "don't lie." Luther calls us, in keeping with Jesus' words in the book of Matthew, to "come to [the defense of our neighbors], to speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light." And isn't that part of being the good in the world? To not only refrain from bringing down the people around us, but to lift them up and offer them grace and give them the benefit of the doubt? Certainly, being the good extends out beyond that – offering help and kindness to those in need, advocating for justice for the marginalized or oppressed, speaking up against hateful or harmful words or actions. But what if we started being the good by focusing on what's in our own hearts? What if we focused on being the good by "[coming to the defense of our neighbors], [speaking] well of them, and interpret[ing] everything they do in the best possible light"? In every interaction we have, even if it's just in the way we deal with frustratingly slow traffic, we have an opportunity to not only believe that there is good in the world... but to *be* the good.

Let us be the good the world so desperately needs.

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### Synod Assembly



SWPA SYNOD ASSEMBLY 2022

Synod Assembly is a time to gather with members of the 151 churches of the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA. Synod Assembly is an opportunity to hear updates from the ministries of the synod as well as participate in the legislative process of the synod. This year's theme is "I Love to Tell the Story," based on the hymn. Katherine Hankey, the author of the poem from which the hymn is taken briefly summarizes the whole story of the Bible. The hymn reminds us that the story of God and God's people throughout the ages should be a focus of Christians. During Synod Assembly, we will tell the story of God and God's people in the synod as well as consider what it means to say "I love to tell the story... the old, old story of Jesus and His love."

Much of the assembly is limited to registered voters, but there are **two public events**:

Presiding Bishop Curry of The Episcopal Church, widely regarded as one of the most dynamic preachers of our times, will be offering the **keynote address on Thursday, June 16<sup>th</sup> at 6pm**. This address will be publicly available on the synod's Facebook page.

On **Friday, June 17 at 7pm there will be three simultaneous in-person worship services** with coffee hour following. All are invited to join in worship, though registration is requested. Worship services will be at Camp Agape, Camp Lutherlyn, and Harrold Zion Lutheran Church in Greensburg, PA. Worship held at Harrold Zion Lutheran Church will be livestreamed on the synod's Facebook page.

## Hymn Stories



During June, we will be singing “Take My Life, That I May Be!” for our offertory hymn. Here is how author Frances Havergal describes the events that inspired the writing of this hymn:

“I went for a little visit of five days. There were ten persons in the house, some unconverted and long prayed for; some converted, but not rejoicing Christians. He gave me the prayer: ‘Lord, give me all in this house.’ And He just DID! Before I left the house everyone had got a blessing. The last night of my visit, after I had retired, the governess asked me to go to the two

daughters. They were crying, etc. Then and there both of them trusted and rejoiced. It was nearly midnight. I was too happy to sleep, and passed most of the night in praise and renewal of my own consecration; and these little couplets formed themselves and chimed in my heart one after another till they finished with ‘ever, only, all for Thee’” (*Lutheran Hymnal Handbook*, 486). This hymn is a beautiful prayer that God would both draw us closer to Himself, and use us to bring others to Him. God calls us to a life of discipleship, and our only response should be, “Here am I. Send me.”

## Church Calendar Notes

On June 5, we celebrate Pentecost (the Greek word *pentekostos* means “50<sup>th</sup>”). In the Christian church, we mark Pentecost as the 50<sup>th</sup> day of Easter. In the ancient Jewish faith, Pentecost was celebrated at the Feast of Weeks, which took place on the 50<sup>th</sup> day after the priest celebrated the first grain that had been harvested in the spring. It was at this time that people were gathering together in our reading for the day in the book of Acts. We read the story of when language barriers were broken down and the Holy Spirit came down by way of tongues of fire after the death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ. This story marks the beginning of the book of Acts, a book that is then all about the very beginning days of the Christian church and its mission in and to the world. Pentecost is therefore often called the “birthday of the church.” While it is often not celebrated with as much occasion as Christmas or Easter, it is considered a major festival within the church. We will celebrate Pentecost with red throughout the church and streamers to celebrate the joy of this birthday celebration. Join us for cake after worship too!

The week after Pentecost is Holy Trinity Sunday, when we grapple with the doctrine of the Holy Trinity: God as three in one and God as one in three. Then we enter what is called “Ordinary Time,” marked by the Sundays after Pentecost. This season lasts until Advent, so expect to see green cloths on the altar and pulpit for the next few months. While the season after Pentecost might seem like a long stretch of time with limited points of celebration or highlights, it is a great time for us as a church to focus on living out the gifts we have been given and how we can use these gifts as we put our hands to God’s work.
